Remap Goes to Council

The Los Angeles Redistricting Commission on Wednesday voted to recommend to the City Council a map outlining new boundaries for 15 council districts.

As the council begins its hearings on the proposed redistricting plan today at City Hall, winners and losers in the commission process were preparing for the next battle.

The proposal increases from four to five those districts in which Latino voters are a plurality. It also increases the number of districts wholly in the San Fernando Valley from four to five.

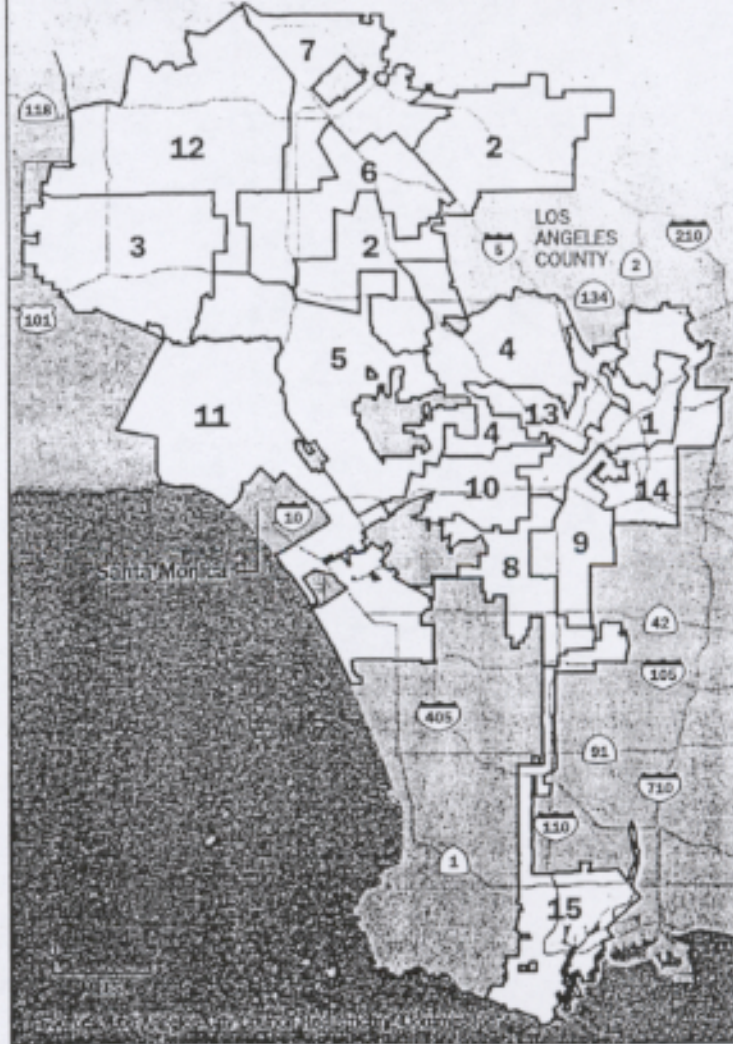
The recommendation also addressed concerns by Councilwoman Wendy Greuel that her 2nd District, as originally proposed, would have become a long, narrow, odd-shaped district that included the disparate communities of Sunland-Tujunga in the East Valley and Encino in the West Valley.

After lobbying from Greuel, who won election March 5, the commission Tuesday recommended a revised plan for a more compact 2nd District that swaps Studio City for Encino and keeps the district east of the San Diego Freeway.

"It keeps communities of interest together," Greuel said.

City Council Districts

The Los Angeles Redistricting Commission has recommended new boundaries for 15 Los Angeles City Council Districts. The proposal, which goes to the City Council, increases from four to five those in which Latino voters are a plurality. It also increases the number of districts wholly in the San Fernando Valley from four to five. The City Council begins hearings on the plan today at City Hall.

Key Vote Expected on L.A. Unified Political Districts

The map chosen tonight by the commission redrawing Los Angeles Board of Education districts is expected to have serious political implications for the representation of the San Fernando Valley and the reelection chances of incumbent board members.

The city's Redistricting Commission for the Los Angeles Unified School District will select one of two proposals and send it to the City Council for approval.

One map, drawn by an appointee of school board President Caprice Young, keeps North Hollywood and Studio City within the confines of a Valley district, but puts the southwest Valley into another district along with West Los Angeles.

The other proposal, drawn by the California Latino Redistricting Coalition and presented by an appointee of board member Julie Korenstein, places North Hollywood and Studio City in the West L.A. district, but puts the southwest Valley into a Valley-only seat.

Each district represents 635,000

residents. The Valley, with a population of 1.44 million, requires representation by the equivalent of 2.2 board members.

Currently, Korenstein represents the East Valley and parts of the central and West Valley. Young's district includes Studio City. The competing maps would land either Korenstein or Young in a district centered in the West Valley, which, with a majority of white voters, could increase chances for reelection.

Neither Korenstein nor Young said that representing the West

Valley was a factor in drawing the proposals. Young said her chances of reelection would not necessarily improve with the map she favors, because she would lose the vast majority of her current constituents. With the map she supports more neighborhoods, such as Boyle Heights and Koreatown, as well as high school feeder zones, would remain intact, she added.

Korenstein said the Valley would be disenfranchised if its southwest region, with such communities as Woodland Hills, were not included in a Valley seat.
